Birds which are listed in **bold** are Kangaroo Island sub-species and in the case of the Kangaroo Island emu- was a dwarf species found nowhere else on earth and is now unfortunately extinct. As of July 2018 total count including vagrants and historic records numbers 269 species.



Nomenclature and order follows International Ornithological Committee Checklist of Australian Birds Version 5.1 Our birds are interesting because of their mix - for example we have some "missing" species which exist on the adjacent mainland but the birds are simply not found here. Such as red-rumped parrots, rufous whistlers, treecreepers and hooded robins. We have also retained species which are in rapid decline or locally extinct on the mainland.

This includes ground-nesters such as bush stone-curlews- their presence is a combination of no foxes (no foxes or rabbits have established on Kangaroo Island), the retention of habitat for daytime refuge (these are nocturnal) and plenty of pasture adjacent these refuges for foraging at night.

We have about 50% of the original vegetation - much of it protected in reserves. Birds which were once common in the Adelaide Hills and the Fleurieu Peninsula such as the glossy-black cockatoo, beautiful fire tails and scarlet robins are regular encounters on Kangaroo Island.

Given our isolation many birds have evolved to be different to mainland versions. Apart from the Kangaroo Island emu which went the way of the Moa and Dodo, are 17 birds with a Kangaroo Island sub-species. Most of these, perhaps unsurprisingly, are smaller bush birds, 6 of which are honeyeaters. These endemics are marked as **bold** in the list.
